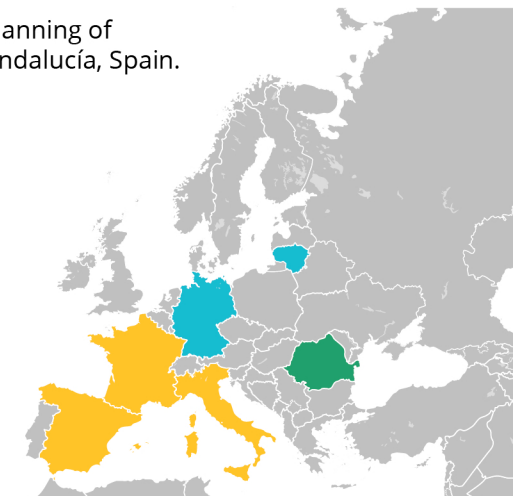

Traditionally, protected areas have been seen as isolated, static spatial entities, exclusively devoted to biodiversity conservation.

Current trends seek to enlarge this model by introducing new concepts such as ecosystem services and green infrastructures.

Protected areas can be seen as natural and economic assets to promote rural development and create green jobs, an urgent matter especially for young people.

However, local economic development should never constitute a threat to biodiversity, particularly in Natura 2000 sites.

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Through international exchange, partners will outline Sustainable Development Plans for protected areas with the direct engagement of regional and local authorities, managers and other relevant stakeholders.

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
